

CENTURY GARDENS YOUTH HUB BREAKS GROUND

Construction has started on Century Gardens Community Youth Hub, a new 12,500 square foot facility for youth between the ages of 14 to 29. The hub will feature a game room and eSports room, creative space, meeting rooms, group education, career counselling, social services and more. Outdoor amenities include an amphitheatre, community gardens, basketball court and soccer court. To ensure the youth hub meets the needs of the community, the City consulted with youth and service providers to obtain input on how to design and program the facility. CRICKET IN BRAMPTON


Brampton is home to 21 cricket fields and premier facilities – and it's only getting better! Over the last four years, more than 25 enhancements have been made to cricket fields. This summer, we launched the first youth cricket league for ages 6 to 15 and recreational cricket programs continue to be offered year-round. The City was proud to once again host the GT20 Canada tournament at the CAA Centre this summer; making its mark as the Cricket Capital of Canada and taking centre stage, garnering coverage from around the world! DOWNTOWN STREETSCAPE PROJECT UNDERWAY

Construction has begun on Main Street (between Nelson Street and Wellington Street) and Queen Street (between Mill Street and Chapel Street). The work involves removal of the existing sidewalk, new infrastructure installation, catch basin relocations, temporary traffic signals and installation of granite pavers and curbs. Construction will be phased and take place at various times between 2024 and 2027. Access to local businesses will remain open.

This initiative is a significant step in the City's ongoing efforts to revitalize the downtown area, aiming to enhance public spaces, support economic development and improve quality of life for residents. Learn more at brampton.ca/downtown



ENHANCING RENTAL PROPERTY STANDARDS IN BRAMPTON

The Residential Rental Licensing (RRL) program is dedicated to improving rental property standards and ensuring the safety and well-being of residents. Owners of properties with one to four rental residential dwelling units in Wards 1, 3, 4, 5 and 7 are required to obtain a licence.

This two-year pilot program focuses on areas where most violations have historically occurred. Penalties for noncompliance include fines of \$600 for the first offence, \$900 for the second offence and \$1,200 for subsequent offences. For more information, visit **brampton.ca/RRL**



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW WHEN IT SNOWS

Winter road crews begin plowing streets when there is five centimetres of accumulated snow, clearing major roads first. Parking on streets is not allowed and will be enforced during winter weather events. Penalties for parked vehicles interfering with snow removal have increased:

- first offence: \$125
- second offence: \$250
- subsequent offences: \$500

Residents must clear snow and ice from their sidewalks by 11 am the day after the end of a snowfall. To help seniors and people with disabilities who not only own, but also rent property, the City has expanded its Financial Assistance Program. Learn more at **brampton.ca/snow**



LEADING THE WAY IN CREATING SAFER STREETS

Road safety is a top priority and the City is taking significant steps to address dangerous driving behaviours. Brampton's Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) program uses cameras and speed measurement devices to enforce speed limits, reminding drivers to slow down. With 50 cameras currently in operation, the program will expand to 185 cameras by 2025, including the addition of a new regional processing center.

Stunt driving, as defined in the Highway Traffic Act, includes driving at excessive speeds, racing and other reckless actions. Those charged with stunt driving face severe consequences, including license suspension, vehicle impoundment and heavy fines. Brampton's proactive approach to road safety demonstrates our commitment to ensuring safer streets for all. Learn more at brampton.ca/ASE



DO NOT FEED WILDLIFE

Feeding wildlife is dangerous for both animals and residents. Residents must secure garbage bins, properly dispose of waste and pick up spilled bird seeds. Leaving food out, improper garbage disposal and spilled bird seeds are prohibited, including in residential areas and parks. Learn more at **brampton.ca/animalservices**

TREES ON PRIVATE PROPERTY

Before having a tree removed from your property, the City's Urban Forestry team must be notified. Property owners do not require permission to prune privately owned trees. Visit brampton.ca/trees to learn about the Tree Preservation By-law and the role you play in protecting trees on private property.



CARBON MONOXIDE AWARENESS

Brampton Fire and Emergency Services urges you to protect your family from the dangers of carbon monoxide—an odorless, tasteless and invisible gas that can be deadly. Make sure to install carbon monoxide alarms near sleeping areas, test them monthly and replace batteries every 10 years. Get more safety tips at BramptonFire.com



PREPARE YOUR 72-HOUR EMERGENCY KIT

Emergencies can occur suddenly and help may take up to 72 hours to arrive. Ensure you're ready by assembling an emergency kit with non-perishable food, water, extra keys, cash, warm blankets, toiletries, a first aid kit, medications and pet supplies. Learn more at brampton.ca/prepared



FIREWORKS SAFETY

Under the Fireworks By-Law, the use, purchase, discharge, possession, display, sale and offer to sell of fireworks is prohibited in Brampton. Sparklers are permitted. Penalties range from \$500 to \$1,000 and up to \$100,000 if a court summons is issued. Learn more at brampton.ca/fireworks



HOW TO PAY A CITY PARKING TICKET

If you receive a Penalty Notice for a parking infraction, you must pay or dispute it within 15 days of the date it is issued. Payments can be made online, in-person, by telephone or by mail. For details, visit brampton.ca/APS




PREPARING BACKPACKS FOR CHILDREN IN SEPTEMBER




