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As we welcome the sunshine and long summer days ahead, let's take a moment to check in with the busy Wards 2 & 6 team! The past few months have flown by with Council meetings, community events and working diligently to ensure that the voices and concerns of our residents are heard at the table.

We have also had the privilege to attend and participate in many events across the city. The City hosted an incredible International Women's Day event at the Rose Theatre where we showcased the talented, diverse women in our community and heard about their professional and personal journeys in their respective fields. As part of the City's commitment to being a gender-inclusive municipality, it recently created a Women's Advisory Committee to serve as a platform for women-identifying members to contribute to municipal governance.

Community safety remains one of our top priorities as your Councillors and for Brampton as a whole. We continue to advocate for community safety initiatives, especially auto theft, which is one of the most pressing issues in Brampton. City staff and Council attended the 2024 Auto Theft Summit, a joint initiative led by police services across Ontario to address auto theft. We explored concrete ways to tackle auto theft including a federal action plan that will strengthen enforcement and the inspection of exports and working with auto manufacturers to address vulnerabilities and explore new anti-theft technologies. We also hosted a tele town hall on auto theft and public safety this past May where we heard directly from our residents about their concerns. We will continue to work with our government partners, law enforcement and other stakeholders to ensure that the issue of auto theft in our communities is addressed.

You are invited to our first Community BBQ on August 10 at Conservation Drive Park, from 1 to 3 pm! As a part of the BBQ, we will be collecting food donations for a local food bank and holding a backpack/school supplies drive. We encourage everyone to participate and hope to see you all there!

HAVE YOUR SAY ON SNOW REMOVAL SERVICES

Brampton's current winter maintenance service contract for roads, sidewalks and transit stops is being renewed.

Residents are invited to take this important survey because the outcome may change taxes for all households, although not all households will receive the services.

- It would cost about \$2.6 million, an average of \$12 per year, per household in property taxes to clear sidewalks.
- It would cost about \$19.6 million, an average of \$86 per year, per household in property taxes to clear windrows (snow ridges left by snowplows) from driveways.

COMBATTING AUTO THEFT

In recent years, auto thefts have dramatically increased, prompting Brampton to advocate for stronger measures to protect its residents.

As a result, in May 2024, the Federal Government introduced the National Action Plan on Combatting Auto Theft, which identifies various measures, such as improving security and monitoring at Canadian ports, that can be implemented by the federal, provincial and territorial governments.

To assist residents from auto thefts, the City is expanding its giveaway of signal blocking pouches, which may prevent relay attacks by blocking the signal from vehicle key FOBs. COYOTE SAFETY TIPS

Coyotes are wary of humans and tend to avoid contact as much as possible. It is important to be respectful of their habitats and exercise caution if a coyote is seen.

Tips to remember:

- Keep pets on leashes.
- Always supervise your pets outdoors, even in your backyard.
- Do not feed wildlife.
- Dispose of waste properly so it can't be accessed by wildlife.

If you encounter a coyote:

- Stay calm and don't run.
- Make yourself large and loud.
- Call 9-1-1 if in danger.

The City prohibits and regulates noise that causes disturbances. Noise such as a dog barking daily and excessively, playing loud music regularly and operating construction equipment daily is prohibited under the Noise By-law. PAYING PROPERTY TAXES

Property taxes are levied twice a year and residents receive an interim and final notice tax bill. Payment is expected in three instalments and can be made by cheque, debit, in person at a Service Brampton location or your bank, online through a bank's website or via pre-authorized payment plan. GARBAGE AND DEBRIS DISPOSAL

Brampton enforces proper garbage disposal and storage standards to uphold community safety.

- Residents must keep yards clear of debris and stagnant water.
- Peel Region waste carts should be clean and not stored street-facing.
- Collection items can be placed after 7 pm the day before and must be removed by 8 pm on collection day.

KEEP BRAMPTON CLEAN AND GREEN

We all have a role to play in contributing to a safe and healthy community.

- Lawns should be kept under eight inches and repaired when damaged.
- Yards should be free of dead or damaged trees.
- Trim hedges and shrubs for visibility.
- Permits are required for some accessory structures and driveway widening when a curb cut is being requested.

ETOBICOKE CREEK

The Etobicoke Creek Wetlands Enhancement Project, a collaboration between the City of Brampton and Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA), aims to improve wetland function and connectivity in the Etobicoke Creek watershed. It involves managing invasive species, expanding shallow emergent marsh vegetation, installing rocky shoals and log piles and planting aquatic and terrestrial species across approximately 65 hectares from Loafer's Lake to Conservation Drive Park. Additionally, the project will offer educational opportunities for the local community to learn about wetland ecology and the significance of habitat restoration and protection. A huge thank you to City staff for making this possible through the Wetlands Conservation partnership program and to our community partners for their advocacy and conservation efforts. TRAFFIC CALMING MEASURES FOR SAFER NEIGHBOURHOODS

To make neighbourhoods safer, the City uses a combination of traffic calming measures to address speeding and reduce excessive traffic volumes.

In 2020, Brampton was one of the first municipalities to implement an Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) program. The program now has 50 cameras and will expand capacity with a new regional processing centre and 185 more cameras by 2025.

City Council has also designated 180 Community Safety Zones, established speed cushions in 63 locations and a 40 km/hr Neighbourhood Safety Zone pilot in five neighbourhoods.
