
Community Safety and Well-Being Strategy





Adopting CSWB – Highlights

- Divisional Mobilization Unit supporting priority populations
- Situation Table provides wrap-around supports to individuals with ↑ risk factors
- Pilot in 21 Division to address underlying addiction issues
- Intimate Partner Violence Unit and new Safe Centre Response Team
- Partnership to deploy non-police teams to lower acuity mental health calls

WHAT IS THE LIGHTHOUSE PROGRAM?

- Special arrangement with Faith-Based Organizations (FBOs) agreeing to participate in the program.
- FBOs open their facilities to the public as a place of refuge during extreme weather events (heat, cold).
- Non-denominational access to the public.





HOW DOES IT WORK?

• No agreements needed to be signed.

• No additional training necessary.

 No obligations to open/close facility during extreme weather events (heat, cold) as a Cooling/Warming Centre.



DIVISION OVERVIEW

The Community Safety & Well-being Office collaborates with partners and stakeholders across multiple levels and sectors to address safety, raise awareness, and build capacity to stimulate action and advocate for community safety and well-being.

• An empowered and connected Brampton where everyone feels safe, has a sense of belonging, and has their needs met. • Collaborating with multilevel partners to address and overcome community concerns.

Office established in 2021 as a Term of Council Priority

COMMUNITY SAFETY ACTION PLAN (2022 - 2027)

Brampton's first-ever Community Safety Action Plan

- Developed 25 actions under 3 priorities:
 - o Safety
 - o Awareness
 - o Empowerment

Engagement

- Conducted 54 neighbourhood visits from 2018-2022
- Engaged over 3000 residents with in-person neighbourhood walks, workshops, and virtual tours
- Received input and feedback from 2800+ completed resident surveys and mapping tool comments
- 50+ residents identified in 2022 for active co-design projects

Collaboration

- Members of 16 multi-sectoral tables and networks
- Board Member of Canadian Municipal Network on Crime Prevention
- In 2022, supported 20+ projects related to safety & well-being
- 20+ active partners
